




















## Record breakers

A record-breaking IRONMAN 70.3 Bolton weekend brought thousands of athletes and spectators to the town at the end of

Over eight thousand people took part in three exciting events and thousands more were on hand to cheer them on enthusiastically.

On Friday 28 June, Night Run got the party started as runners of all ages and abilities filled the streets of the town centre.

The next day, Bolton's IRONKIDS was the biggest ever held anywhere in the world, with nearly 6,000 children and young people making it a day to remember.

On Sunday, over 2,000 amazing IRONMAN 70.3 athletes swam, cycled and ran their way through a staggering 70.3 miles.

A significant uptick in female sign-ups across the weekend saw a 40 per cent increase for Sunday's IRONMAN 70.3 alone, with women accounting for nearly a fifth of places.

#### Put Big Light On Festival 2024, Thurs 5 to Sun 8 December

After the huge success of the first Put Big Light On festival in Bolton, we're excited to reveal that the popular light art trail will be returning once again this year. A fantastic display of light art installations from around the world lit up the town. This year, one of the mesmerising light installations will be Gaia, created by UK artist, Luke Jerram, who brought the Museum of the Moon to last year's festival. Measuring six metres in diameter, Gaia features 120dpi detailed NASA imagery of the Earth's surface (compiled from the Visible Earth series). The artwork provides the opportunity to see our planet on this scale, floating in threedimensions.

Funded by the government's Towns Fund and named in honour of Queen Elizabeth II, the new park is a key piece in the regeneration of this area of the town centre.

"It brings flowers, trees and wildlife into the heart of the town, which are so important for people's sense of wellbeing, and is destined to become a much-loved place for everyone who works, lives, or goes out in the town centre."

## Exciting future for Bolton's regeneration

Elizabeth Park and Bolton Market Food Hall are just two of the major regeneration projects transforming our borough.

The Wellsprings Innovation Hub will be a new home for business start-ups when it opens later this year.

Meanwhile, the Moor Lane, Deansgate Gardens, St George's Road and Farnworth Green developments are creating vibrant neighbourhoods with much-needed new homes.

Building on this success, three recently announced projects will deliver even more positive change for Bolton:

### A Mayoral Development Corporation for Bolton

In April, the Mayor of Greater Manchester, Andy Burnham announced a new Mayoral Development Corporation (MDC) for Bolton.

Based on the successful model already used in Stockport, the MDC will turbo-charge Bolton's regeneration by boosting investment and creating a 2040 masterplan.

Andy Burnham said:

The council has already made a great start with new start-up space and residential development coming to the town centre and this is the perfect time for an MDC to bring a much bigger vision for Bolton together.

#### Farnworth Long Term Plan

Farnworth recently secured £20m from the Long Term Plan for Towns programme, to fund projects over the next ten years.

Earlier this year, residents were asked how the money should be invested, and now a 'Focus on Farnworth Board' has been set up with representation from local residents, businesses and community groups.

The board will meet regularly to develop a plan that addresses local priorities and makes the changes people in Farnworth want to see.

#### Wigan-Bolton Growth Corridor

The Wigan-Bolton Growth Corridor is one of six areas across Greater Manchester identified as having real potential for growth and regeneration.

The area between the two towns, known as NorthFold, has been earmarked for sustainable housing development and new business opportunities.

The project will build on the area's existing strengths in transport, logistics and manufacturing and be a base for the emerging heath innovation sector.

## Grackdown on

### illegal vapes

## 30,515 illegal vapes have been taken off the streets in the past six months.

Bolton Council's crackdown on illegal vapes continues thanks to the hard work of the Trading Standards team.

A team of officers - dedicated to tackling illicit products - have in the past six months seized approximately 30,515 vapes from businesses across Bolton.

Typically bought for around £6 per device, and sold for between £10 -13 each, this puts the total retail value at around £350K.

Illegal vapes have been found in a variety of places within premises, with some displayed at point of sale as

well as those more discreetly hidden in locked stockrooms. Just under 4000 illegal vapes were seized from one premises alone.

Businesses raided include convenience stores, off-licences, mobile phone shops, petrol stations and vehicles. The premises are now being further investigated and may be subject to prosecution and possible closure orders.

Most vapes seized have now been sent for recycling.

Cllr Sue Haworth, Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for Regulatory Services said:

"Illegal vapes are unregulated and often contain illegal ingredients which can be detrimental to health. "We continue to look at enforcement options like closure orders that will deliver a long-term solution to combating the problem.

"Tackling the sale of illegal vapes remains a priority for this council."

## Lever Gardens Court extra care development opens

The Mayor of Bolton, Cllr Andrew Morgan officially opened, Lever Gardens Court, the town's new flagship extra care facility earlier in July.

Commissioned by Bolton Council, Lever Gardens Court is managed by Bolton at Home, providing safe and secure homes for those aged 55 and over who may need some support and care to live on their own.

The £12.5m scheme, which welcomed its first residents in April, is almost now fully occupied.

The new residents have already said how "life-changing" their new homes have been for them, commenting on the friendly staff, fabulous community spirit and ease of making new friends.

The 62 modern self-contained apartments support independent living with intercom, emergency alarm with easy access to landscaped gardens and on-site parking.

There's also large communal spaces, plus professional 24-hour support and tailored care services provided by Bolton Cares. In addition to the apartments there are six bungalows that give residents more options including opting out of some of the care services provided.



Lever Gardens Court provides a home within a home that is close to local shops, amenities and healthcare services and bus stops, helping support the tenants health, wellbeing and independence throughout older age.

### Smokefree Bolton

Smokefree Bolton offer smokers free tools and support to guit and improve their health overnight.

This is a great opportunity for smokers, who on average will lose 10 years of their life if they continue to smoke.

The great news is that almost half of smokers say they want to quit, and after 28 smokefree days, they are five times more likely to quit for good.

Also, smokers receiving specialist help are three times more likely to succeed in quitting, which is not only good for the smoker's health but also means they are likely to be better off with most spending £2,000 on buying cigarettes every year.

On average, more people in Bolton smoke than they do in other parts of the country, with about 42,000 who light up every day.

This is bad news for the health of local people as smoking causes 1 in 4 cancer deaths in the UK, as well as being a big risk for strokes and heart attacks.

Those making a quit attempt with Smokefree Bolton can get 12 weeks free personalised support, free vapes and nicotine replacement products, behavioural support, mobile apps and pharmacist advice.

There's also support from national organisations, local targeted help in the community, digital apps, national companies such as Allen Carr's Easyway Stop Smoking Method, and most effectively, via a combination of behaviour support and nicotine replacement therapies.

Marine Cadet Corporal Murphy Hall has taken on the ceremonial position to assist the Mayor during formal civic events, ceremonies, and public functions.

Appointed for one year, the role of Mayor's Cadet is filled by a young member of Bolton's Army Cadet Force, Air Training Corps or Sea Cadets Corps.

Corporal Hall's first duty was to attend the D-Day 80th anniversary commemoration service at Bolton Parish Church where he lit the official beacon at the top of the church tower.

The Mayor of Bolton said:

years, and as a veteran, I
decided that I would like to
reintroduce this honorary
position for my Mayoral

"I know Murphy will be a great asset to the Mayoral Party and an absolute credit to our town and borough."

Marine Corporal Murphy Hall said: "To be the Mayor's Cadet is an honour and I will endeavour to live up to expectations and give my all to this prestigious role.

"I believe I am the first Mayor's Cadet in a very long time in Bolton, so I hope to set a high standard as a precedent for future cadets who will follow me being trusted with this fantastic opportunity."

## Supporting veterans: Bolton goes for gold

Last year, Bolton Council earned the Silver Award under the Ministry of Defence Employer Recognition Scheme.

The scheme highlights those employers who go above and beyond to support the wider Armed Forces community.

It rewards employers who support reservists, service leavers and their families, cadets, and cadet volunteers. Off the back of this, the council now hopes to achieve the Gold Award in 2025.

To help us achieve this, we are developing our support to other organisations in Bolton who want to do more for veterans.

This includes helping local employers find out more about the recognition scheme, The Armed Forces Covenant and the many benefits to being Armed-Forces-friendly.

# We're making some changes to your bin collections

In July, we made some changes to bin collections and you may now have a new collection day.

You should now have received your new bin calendar through your door. This lists all collections up to December 2024 and includes some reminders on what to put in each bin.

Bin collection days are also listed on the council website: www.bolton.gov.uk/nextbincollection.

#### Why have the changes been made?

Routes have been revised to increase reliability, enable more efficient waste collection and improve customer service. In addition to the change of bin day, paper and cardboard (beige) bin collections have changed from every two weeks to every four weeks.

Over the years, a significant reduction in the purchase of newspapers, magazines and paper in general has meant waste collection crews have found many beige bins are not full on collection day.

Collecting less than full bins doesn't deliver maximum efficiencies for the service, particularly when considering the cost of operating a bin wagon.

#### New waste vehicles rolling into town

In addition to the revised routes, nine new bin wagons will be in use, with a further ten vehicles arriving in the

coming weeks. The new vehicles will replace the existing fleet as part of an ongoing fleet replacement project. Fitted with more energy-efficient engines, the new vehicles will use less fuel per mile travelled and produce less CO2 emissions.

#### **Bolton Council's Executive Cabinet Member for** Climate Change and Environment, Cllr Richard Silvester said:

"Having not seen any changes since 2010, our waste collection service has needed an overhaul for quite some time. With thousands of additional properties in some areas, routes needed to be revised.

"By reconfiguring our routes, all residents will benefit from an improved service. In addition, the new vehicles will further improve efficiency and reduce our carbon footprint. As new vehicles are received, we are systematically decommissioning our older, unreliable vehicles.

"I know the revised collections of paper and cardboard have caused some concern amongst residents, but I want to assure everyone that these measures have been taken to provide a more efficient and reliable service.



### Before you go...

#### New powers to tackle abandoned trolleys

Abandoned shopping trolleys will now be removed by the council in a bid to tackle the blight of flytipping.

Between February and March this year, Bolton Council ran a public consultation on how it should tackle the issue. More than half of the respondents agreed that Bolton Council should adopt national legislation.

From now on, a storage cost of  $\mathfrak{L}5$  per day per trolley will apply to retailers, and a charge of  $\mathfrak{L}50$  for the initial collection by the council will also be payable. Retailers can request the return of each trolley collected by the council for which a charge of  $\mathfrak{L}100$  per trolley will apply. Retailers will have six weeks to collect their trolleys before they are disposed of, at the retailers' expense. Many shops are already signed up to a voluntary collection schemes.

#### Tributes to Sir Howard Bernstein

Bolton Council's Chief Executive, Sue Johnson, has paid tribute to Sir Howard Bernstein who passed away in June

He served as Chief Executive of Manchester City Council for 19 years and played a central role in the devolution of powers to Greater Manchester.

Sue Johnson said: "He was a remarkable figurehead for the region and leaves a lasting legacy for both Manchester and Bolton."
